

TICAD SUMMIT: A FORUM TO DISCUSS AFRICAN DEVELOPMENT



A MESSAGE FROM H.E. HOSHIYAMA, EMBASSY OF JAPAN

TICAD 8 is to be held in a very timely manner, as the African continent is now facing various challenges such as the fight against the COVID-19 pandemic, which is already in its 3rd year, coupled with a global economic recession. In addition, Russia's invasion of Ukraine has caused a rise in energy and food prices that has negatively affected Africa and the whole world. This situation may shake the very foundations of our democracy and stable international order. Therefore, it is important that TICAD 8 will discuss African development issues and come up with both short term measures and long term goals, including SDGs.

Since 1993, the TICAD process has continuously advocated the importance of "ownership" by African countries, of their development processes, and "partnership" by the international community in support of such ownership, for African development. During the age of globalization, the world has become more complex, and a number of issues, such as climate change, digital divide, infectious diseases, the fight against terrorists and debt crisis require to be dealt with simultaneously.

The Government of Botswana has been a strong supporter of the TICAD process, as a leading democratic nation in Africa. The second President of Botswana, Sir Ketumile Masire, greatly contributed to the success of the first TICAD in 1993, as one of the few eminent African leaders who attended, a role that the government of Japan expected him to do. Following this, other Botswana leaders have displayed similar commitment to TICAD. I am pleased to point out that Japan pioneered the cause for African development after the end of the Cold War, as the



largest ODA donor at the time, with other countries following suit to set up similar forums later.

TICAD is a unique approach to African development because it is not only an open forum in which African countries, international organizations, non-African countries, the business sector, and civil society can all participate, but it also has integral values as well as follow-up mechanisms installed within the TICAD process.

During TICAD 8, leaders will also discuss "Peace and Security" which is one of the core pillars of TICAD 8. Japan would like to adhere to the principles on which the international community stands, including the United Nations Charter, the UN Security Council reform, a world free from nuclear weapons, the prevention of armed conflicts, and maritime peace, including the Free and Open Indo-Pacific Strategy (FOIP).

In Botswana, Japanese ODA has been utilized in various sectors, including COVID-19 related areas in recent years. The Japanese government will strengthen our cooperation with the Botswana government in accordance with the country development policy for Botswana and the result of TICAD8.

A MESSAGE FROM DR. HORVÁTH, UNDP REPRESENTATIVE

The TICAD8 provides an opportunity to tackle challenges confronting the continent—notably the COVID-19 pandemic and the impact of Russia's invasion of Ukraine—and to capitalize on the opportunities.

The challenges have caused Africa's first recession this century (reversing progress in poverty reduction, disrupting trade, reducing employment and learning opportunities); and in Botswana, high inflation and a soaring food and fuel import bill (albeit cushioned by strong diamond revenues).

The goals of TICAD and UNDP are closely aligned. TICAD holds the promise of enhancing regional integration, which is key for resilient & inclusive socio-economic development.

Botswana, a small, open economy highly dependent on trade, has a strong interest in Africa becoming an integrated continent.

The next important step for Botswana is ratification of the African Continental Free Trade Area Agreement (AfCFTA). The successful implementation of AfCFTA would help boost economies of scale and investments necessary for the emergence of broad regional value chains.

It would also directly support Africa's transformational development agenda in line with the SDGs and the aspirations of AU Agenda 2063.

UNDP's Strategic Offer and its Regional Programme for Africa also highlight these goals as critical for the continent's sustainable development.

A highly productive approach would be to couple financial assistance to Africa for addressing key SDG objectives and recovery from



the twin crises with a coordinated improvement by African countries of the regulatory framework for trade and the environment. Regulatory streamlining, in tandem with digitization, standardization and legislation that supports sustainable cross-border trade, would reduce its costs and risks, and could substantially boost trade-related infrastructure investment to raise productivity and real incomes.

UNDP's Regulation as Stimulus model (joint with AfCFTA Secretariat and Africa Investor) estimates that improving the business environment, access to finance, and enhancing infrastructure, while cutting "before-the-border" compliance costs (involving trade documents, procedures) and "at-the-border costs and delays" would amount to a massive economic stimulus with minimal fiscal cost.

In particular, they could add \$500 billion to business revenue; create 260,000 more jobs by 2025 in Africa; and also curb inequality by lifting sectors where women are predominant by 18%. UNDP looks forward to a very successful TICAD-8 Conference.

TICAD stands for Tokyo International Conference on African Development. TICAD is the flagship of Japan's diplomacy towards Africa since 1993 and has promoted Africa's development in partnership with United Nations, United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), World Bank and African Union Commission (AUC). This year, TICAD8 will be held in Tunisia from 27th to 28th August 2022. This is the second time TICAD is held in Africa where Kenya hosted TICAD 6 in 2016. In case of TICAD7 held in Yokohama in 2019, where more than 10,000 people participated, including 42 African leaders and some ministers, 52 development partner countries, 108 heads of international and regional organizations, and representatives of civil society and the private sector.

However, the continent is also facing various challenges such as conflicts and poverty.

In particular, the COVID-19 has revealed Africa's vulnerability including in the field of health and medical sectors.

With its history of over a quarter of a century, TICAD is gaining

further significance as a multilateral international conference to address development issues in Africa, including in the area of health.

The Government of Botswana has actively participated in the TICAD process since the very beginning. His Excellency Sir Ketumile Masire was one of the five heads of states to attend the First TICAD (1993), and since then, Botswana has been represented by high level dignitaries to TICAD including His Excellency Mr. Festus Mogae and His Excellency Lt. Gen. Dr. Ian Khama Seretse Khama.

This year, toward TICAD8, Honourable Dr. Lemogang Kwappe took part in the Ministerial Meeting in March and fully committed to providing a secure, attractive, and sustainable environment for private sector investment, which is one of the areas to be discussed under the TICAD Framework. Japanese Embassy co-organized a business seminar with Business Investment and Trade Centre (BITC) in June to promote investment between Japan and Botswana.

In this July, the Japan-Botswana TICAD seminar was organized by Japanese embassy, UN agencies and Civil society partners to understand each other's efforts towards TICAD8. We look forward that TICAD8 will bring concrete results to support Africa's development and Botswana's growth.

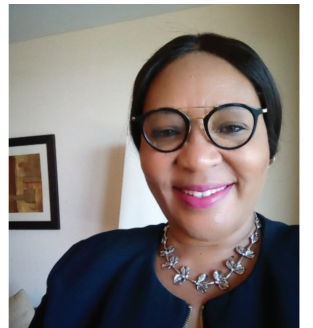

TICAD 8, aiming to discuss the African development program, could not have come at a better time for Africa. Japan has a defined, carefully planned, and targeted important pillar of diplomacy towards Africa which has been in place since 1993, The Tokyo International Conference on African Development (TICAD). What makes the TICAD to be unique is its multilateral and multi-stakeholders architecture, co-organized by the government of Japan, the African Union Commission (AUC), UNDP, UNOSAA, and the World Bank, also opened to other international organizations, private sector, private foundations, and CSOs. The inclusion of the AUC and CSOs through the Civic Commission for Africa (CCFA) for Africa, and Africa Japan Forum (JAF) in Japan, ensure that commitments are aligned to Africa's priorities and that all voices are brought to the discourse, giving Africa a forum to voice the continent's identified consolidated and common positions influenced by its similar challenges.

CCFA and its Japanese colleagues wish the TICAD 8 co-organizers a fruitful summit and call on them to commit to capacitating African Governments, in their pursuit to "Build Forward Better", to seriously address the social and economic impacts of the 'Triple Crises' namely the COVID-19 pandemic, and the Russia and Ukraine war, and Climate Change, and to ensure that the gains made towards achieving the SDGs prior to the COVID-19 outbreak, are invigorated.

We hope this TICAD8 will be another opportunity for new future collaborations and businesses between African and Japan. In Botswana, on the 1st of June, JETRO took part in a Business Seminar organized by the Embassy of Japan in Botswana and the Botswana Investment and Trade Centre (BITC) in order to promote private sector exchange, looking ahead to TICAD 8.
